# **Assay Summary**

**Step 1**. Add 25  $\mu$ l of Standard or Sample and 25  $\mu$ l of Biotinylated Protein per well. Incubate 2 hours.

**Step 2**. Wash, then add 50  $\mu$ l of SP Conjugate per well. Incubate 30 minutes.

**Step 3.** Wash, then add 50  $\mu$ l of Chromogen Substrate per well. Incubate 15 minutes.

**Step 4.** Add 50  $\mu$ l of Stop Solution per well. Read at 450 nm immediately.

#### Introduction

Alpha-1-antitrypsin (A1AT) is a protein that protects the lungs. The liver usually makes the protein and releases it into the bloodstream. A1AT is a major protease inhibitor that controls tissue degradation. A reduction of A1AT levels can cause a change in collagen metabolism (1). A1AT inhibits neutrophil elastase release into the lungs during inflammatory states (2). A1AT deficiency is an uncommon genetic disease (3) that can lead to emphysema (4), hepatitis, cirrhosis (5), and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) [6].

#### Principle of the Assay

The AssayMax™ Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin ELISA (Enzyme-Linked Immunosorbent Assay) Kit is designed for detection of A1AT in human plasma and serum samples. This assay employs a quantitative competitive enzyme immunoassay technique that measures human A1AT in approximately 3 hours. A polyclonal antibody specific for human A1AT has been pre-coated onto a 96-well microplate with removable strips. A1AT in standards and samples is competed with a biotinylated human A1AT protein sandwiched by the immobilized antibody and streptavidin-peroxidase (SP) conjugate. All unbound material is washed away and a peroxidase enzyme substrate is added. The color development is stopped and the intensity of the color is measured.

# **Caution and Warning**

- This product is for Research Use Only and is not intended for use in diagnostic procedures.
- Prepare all reagents (diluent buffer, wash buffer, standard, biotinylated protein, and SP conjugate), as instructed, prior to running the assay.
- Prepare all samples prior to running the assay. The dilution factors for the samples are suggested in this insert. However, the user should determine the optimal dilution factor.
- Spin down the SP conjugate vial before opening and using contents.

- The Stop Solution is an acidic solution.
- The kit should not be used beyond the expiration date.

#### Reagents

- Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Microplate: A 96-well polystyrene microplate (12 strips of 8 wells) coated with a polyclonal antibody against human A1AT.
- Sealing Tapes: Each kit contains 3 precut, pressure sensitive sealing tapes that can be cut to fit the format of the individual assay.
- Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Standard: Human A1AT in a buffered protein base, calibrated against WHO International Standard (80 μg, lyophilized).
- Biotinylated Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Protein (1x): Lyophilized.
- MIX Diluent Concentrate (10x): A 10-fold concentrated buffered protein base (30 ml).
- Wash Buffer Concentrate (20x): A 20-fold concentrated buffered surfactant (30 ml).
- SP Conjugate (100x): A 100-fold concentrate (80 μl).
- Chromogen Substrate (1x): A stabilized peroxidase chromogen substrate tetramethylbenzidine (7 ml).
- Stop Solution (1x): A 0.5 N hydrochloric acid solution to stop the chromogen substrate reaction (11 ml).
- Positive Control: 1 vial, lyophilized. See insert CEA50011.

#### **Storage Condition**

- Upon arrival, immediately store components of the kit at recommended temperatures up to the expiration date.
- Store SP Conjugate at -20°C.
- Store Microplate, Diluent Concentrate (10x), Wash Buffer, Stop Solution, and Chromogen Substrate at 2-8°C.
- Unused microplate wells may be returned to the foil pouch with the desiccant packs and resealed. May be stored for up to 30 days in a vacuum desiccator.
- Store Standard and Biotinylated Protein at 2-8°C before reconstituting with Diluent and at -20°C after reconstituting with Diluent.

# **Other Supplies Required**

- Microplate reader capable of measuring absorbance at 450 nm
- Pipettes (1-20 μl, 20-200 μl, 200-1000 μl, and multiple channel)
- Deionized or distilled reagent grade water

#### Sample Collection, Preparation, and Storage

- Plasma: Collect plasma using one-tenth volume of 0.1 M sodium citrate as an anticoagulant. Centrifuge samples at 3000 x g for 10 minutes and collect plasma. A 400-fold sample dilution is suggested into MIX Diluent; however, user should determine optimal dilution factor depending on application needs. The undiluted samples can be stored at -20°C or below for up to 3 months. Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles (EDTA or Heparin can also be used as an anticoagulant).
- **Serum:** Samples should be collected into a serum separator tube. After clot formation, centrifuge samples at 3000 x g for 10 minutes and remove serum. A 400-fold sample dilution is suggested into MIX Diluent; however, user should determine optimal dilution factor depending on application needs. The undiluted samples can be stored at -20°C or below for up to 3 months. Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles.

Applicable samples may also include biofluids, cell culture, and tissue homogenates. If necessary, user should determine optimal dilution factor depending on application needs.

#### Reagent Preparation

- Freshly dilute all reagents and bring all reagents to room temperature before use.
- MIX Diluent Concentrate (10x): Dilute the MIX Diluent Concentrate 10fold with reagent grade water to produce a 1x solution. When diluting the concentrate, make sure to rinse the bottle thoroughly to extract any

- precipitates left in the bottle. Mix the 1x solution gently until the crystals have completely dissolved. Store for up to 30 days at 2-8°C.
- Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Standard: Reconstitute the Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Standard (80 μg) with 0.5 ml of MIX Diluent to generate a 160 μg/ml standard stock solution. Allow the vial to sit for 10 minutes with gentle agitation prior to making dilutions. Prepare duplicate or triplicate standard points by serially diluting from the standard stock solution (160 μg/ml) 4-fold with MIX Diluent to produce 40, 10, 2.5, 0.625, and 0.156 μg/ml solutions. MIX Diluent serves as the zero standard (0 μg/ml). Any remaining stock solution should be stored at -20°C and used within 30 days. Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles.

- Biotinylated Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Protein (1x): Reconstitute the Biotinylated Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Protein with 5 ml of MIX Diluent to generate a stock solution. Allow the vial to sit for 10 minutes with gentle agitation prior to use. Any remaining stock solution should be stored at -20°C and used within 30 days. Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles.
- Wash Buffer Concentrate (20x): Dilute the Wash Buffer Concentrate 20fold with reagent grade water to produce a 1x solution. When diluting
  the concentrate, make sure to rinse the bottle thoroughly to extract any
  precipitates left in the bottle. Mix the 1x solution gently until the crystals
  have completely dissolved.
- SP Conjugate (100x): Spin down the SP Conjugate briefly and dilute the desired amount of the conjugate 100-fold with MIX Diluent to produce a 1x solution. The undiluted conjugate should be stored at -20°C.

# **Assay Procedure**

- Prepare all reagents, standard solutions, and samples as instructed. Bring all reagents to room temperature before use. The assay is performed at room temperature (20-25°C).
- Remove excess microplate strips from the plate frame and return them immediately to the foil pouch with desiccants inside. Reseal the pouch

- securely to minimize exposure to water vapor and store in a vacuum desiccator.
- Add 25 μl of Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Standard or sample to each well, and immediately add 25 μl of Biotinylated Human alpha-1-Antitrypsin Protein to each well (on top of the standard or sample). Gently tap plate to ensure thorough mixing. Break any bubbles that may have formed. Cover wells with a sealing tape and incubate for 2 hours. Start the timer after the last addition.
- Wash the microplate manually or automatically using a microplate washer. Invert the plate and decant the contents; hit 4-5 times on absorbent material to completely remove the liquid. If washing manually, wash five times with 200 µl of Wash Buffer per well. Invert the plate each time and decant the contents; hit 4-5 times on absorbent material to completely remove the liquid. If using a microplate washer, wash six times with 300 µl of Wash Buffer per well; invert the plate and hit 4-5 times on absorbent material to completely remove the liquid.
- Add 50 µl of SP Conjugate to each well. Gently tap plate to thoroughly coat the wells. Break any bubbles that may have formed. Cover wells with a sealing tape and incubate for 30 minutes. Turn on the microplate reader and set up the program in advance.
- Wash the microplate as described above.
- Add 50 µl of Chromogen Substrate to each well. Gently tap plate to thoroughly coat the wells. Break any bubbles that may have formed. Incubate in ambient light for 15 minutes or until the optimal blue color density develops.
- Add 50  $\mu$ l of Stop Solution to each well. The color will change from blue to yellow. Gently tap plate to ensure thorough mixing. Break any bubbles that may have formed.
- Read the absorbance on a microplate reader at a wavelength of 450 nm immediately. If wavelength correction is available, subtract readings at 570 nm from those at 450 nm to correct optical imperfections.
   Otherwise, read the plate at 450 nm only. Please note that some unstable black particles may be generated at low concentration points after stopping the reaction for about 10 minutes, which will reduce the readings.

# **Data Analysis**

- Calculate the mean value of the duplicate or triplicate readings for each standard and sample.
- To generate a standard curve, plot the graph using the standard concentrations on the x-axis and the corresponding mean 450 nm absorbance (OD) on the y-axis. The best fit line can be determined by regression analysis using log-log or four-parameter logistic curve fit.

 Determine the unknown sample concentration from the Standard Curve and multiply the value by the dilution factor.



#### Reference Value

- Normal human A1AT plasma and serum levels range from 0.7 – 1.9 mg/ml.
- Plasma and serum samples from healthy adults were tested (n=40). On average, human A1AT level was 1.42 mg/ml.

#### **Performance Characteristics**

- Kit standard has been calibrated against WHO International Standard.
- The minimum detectable dose of human A1AT as calculated by 2SD from the mean of a zero standard was established to be 0.12 µg/ml.
- Intra-assay precision was determined by testing three plasma samples twenty times in one assay.
- Inter-assay precision was determined by testing three plasma samples in twenty assays.
